Are you wanting to raise a strong and confident child...teaching **assertiveness** is key.

Few of us are born assertive, and the fear of seeming rude or selfish can prevent us from advocating for ourselves.

But being assertive is far from being rude. Assertive children know how to stand up for themselves (and others) without being hurtful or mean. They can say “no,” communicate clearly, and maintain positive relationships.

Fortunately, with practice, we can help our children master this powerful ability.

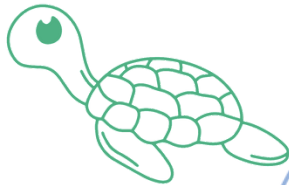
This week’s parenting guide, **"How to Teach Assertiveness to Children,"** provides tips on how to teach children the difference between being passive or aggressive and being assertive.

How to Teach Assertiveness to Children

Explain KEY differences:

Being passive

"I'M OK WITH WHATEVER YOU WANT."



- You hide
- You feel you have no control.
- You're not expressing your needs
- You avoid problems.
- A lack of eye contact

Being assertive

"I DON'T WANT TO PLAY TAG. DO YOU WANT TO PLAY FOOTBALL INSTEAD?"



- You inform
- You're in control of yourself.
- You respect your and others' needs.
- You are calm but firm.
- A steady eye contact

Being aggressive

"YOU CAN'T PLAY WITH ME IF YOU DON'T PLAY THIS GAME."



- You attack
- You want to control others.
- You focus on your own needs only.
- You're rude or bossy.
- Eye rolling
